<u>Ordering events on a timeline.</u>

The earth is around 4,500,000,000 (4.5 billion) years old. We can't possibly know exactly how old, so we wouldn't know when to start counting from.

The system we use has no zero. It works forwards from 1AD (AD) and backwards from 1BC (BC).


BC stands for 'Before Christ' and AD stands for 'Anno Domini' (the year of the lord). Some people use BCE and CE instead of AD and BC.


It's hard to get your head round, but our written history in Britain began only a tiny blip in time ago, courtesy of the Romans in AD43!




Significant events from Stone age to Iron age.









Stone age to iron age
