

Year 7 Transition Information for Parents & Carers September 2022 - 2023



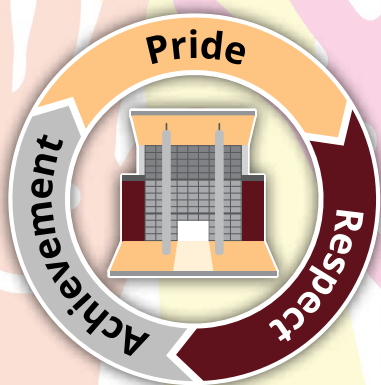

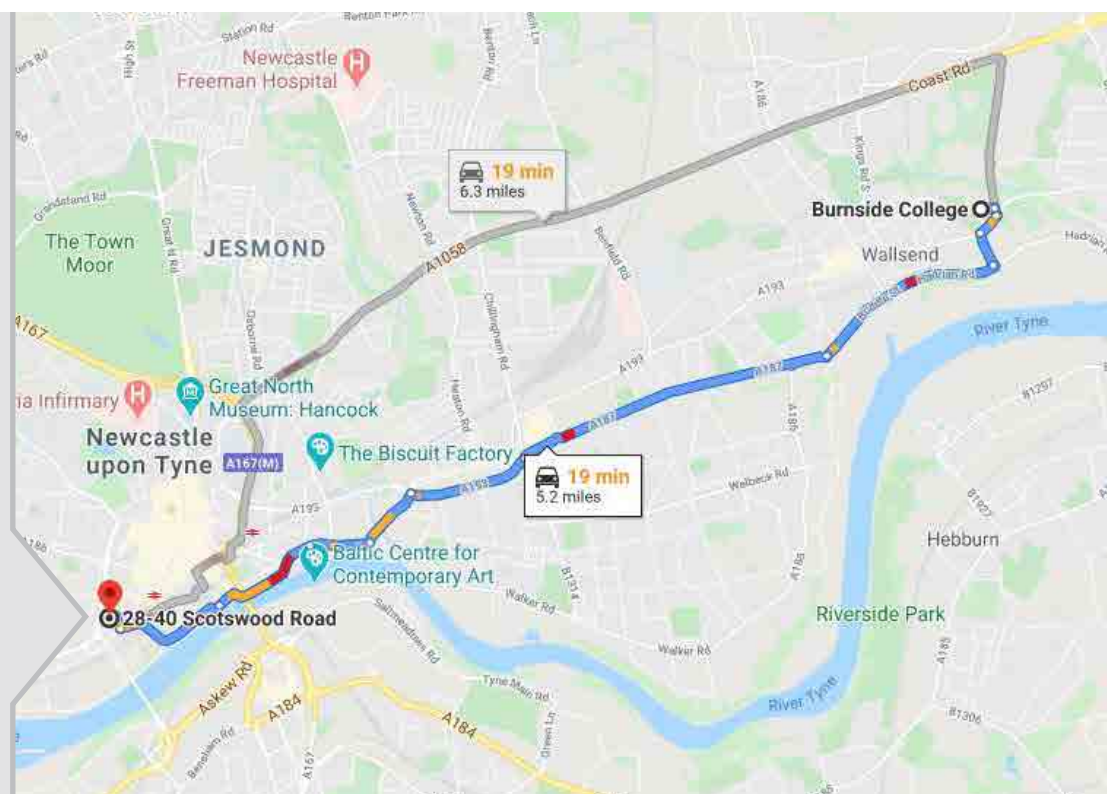

- **Plain** white shirt - long sleeved or short sleeved

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Grey Burnside College V-neck jumper, Burnside College Clip-on tie , Plain white shirt long or short sleeve, Grey school trousers, leggings, jeggings, jeans or jersey material are not acceptable.

OR

Grey knee length pleated skirt, skirt should be worn with plain black tights, plain black shoes that are leather or leather look. Trainers, suede, canvas or plimsolls are not allowed. There must be no other colours or branding and no heels.

We do not allow:

- Any extreme hairstyle or extreme colouring ('extreme' is defined by the Student Council as any hairstyle which distracts students from their learning)
- Any jewellery other than **a single pair of studs**, one in each ear
- A watch may be worn **but not a smart watch**
- Face piercings
- Acrylic or gel nails, or any nail extensions
- Nail varnish
- Tattoos or body art
- Excessive makeup (including false or semi-permanent eyelashes)
- Hoodies or zip up material sports tops. A waterproof, full-zip, outdoor coat is acceptable and should be removed when indoors
- Hats or hoods in school

For medical issues, authorisation is needed from a senior member of staff who will decide if a reasonable adjustment will be made on medical grounds.

If you have any questions about uniform please contact your child's Progress Leader in the first instance. They will be happy to clarify any queries.

Year 7 students will be provided with a Burnside bag at no cost to parents/carers. This will be an essential part of the school uniform. If bags are defaced or lost there is an expectation that a new one is purchased from Michael Seghal at a cost of £12.99

All students must use a school bag to carry books, PE kit and work. Students must bring a pen, pencil and ruler every day.

Form Tutors and Progress Leaders will carry out regular checks and failure to bring the correct equipment will result in sanctions applied via the Behaviour Policy.



At Burnside, we are passionate about high quality teaching and learning. Our relentless drive to improve the quality of our lessons has led to improved progress and attainment for our students.

Our GCSE results are **rising year on year**. Attainment is now **above the national average** and students make excellent progress.

We have **high expectations** of all students and encourage them to rise to the challenge of our demanding and ambitious curriculum.

We have established an ambitious and demanding curriculum which enables all students to succeed. The curriculum is broad, balanced and challenging at Key Stage 3 and this prepares students well for the demands of year 10 and 11.

Our **REMARKable learning** framework is at the heart of our lesson planning. In every lesson, students will recap prior knowledge to ensure they retain this over time. We prioritise high quality modelling as well as **challenging and engaging lessons to ensure our students thrive**.

96% and above. Attendance is monitored by Attendance Officers. Continuing good attendance will result in access to end of year rewards and treats.

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96% - 92%. Attendance is monitored by Attendance Officers and Progress Leaders. Further decline may result in the issuing of a Penalty Notice Warning (PNW) which can result in a fixed penalty of £60.00 being imposed.

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92% and below. Attendance will be monitored by Attendance Officers and parents/carers will be invited in for an attendance meeting. Further decline will result in referral to the Attendance and Placement Service for possible legal action.

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There are 365 days in a calendar year - 175 days are not spent in school. That leaves plenty of time for holidays, shopping and appointments! Just 17 days absence in any one year is equivalent to one GCSE grade drop in achievement.

Punctuality is also important to us and can also become an attendance issue. In some instances if punctuality issues continue to decline we can issue a fixed penalty notice which could also result in a fine. We would rather not do this and if there are genuine reasons for such issues please contact Mrs D Liddle in Attendance who can offer support

We do not authorise leave of absences during term time. If this occurs we may request a fixed penalty be issued to you from the Attendance and Placement Service. This is £60.00 per parent, per child and can lead to further legal action if unpaid.

At Burnside we are keen to reward students for all positive interactions with staff and other students. The College has invested in the ClassCharts behaviour for learning and attendance software which is used across all year groups.

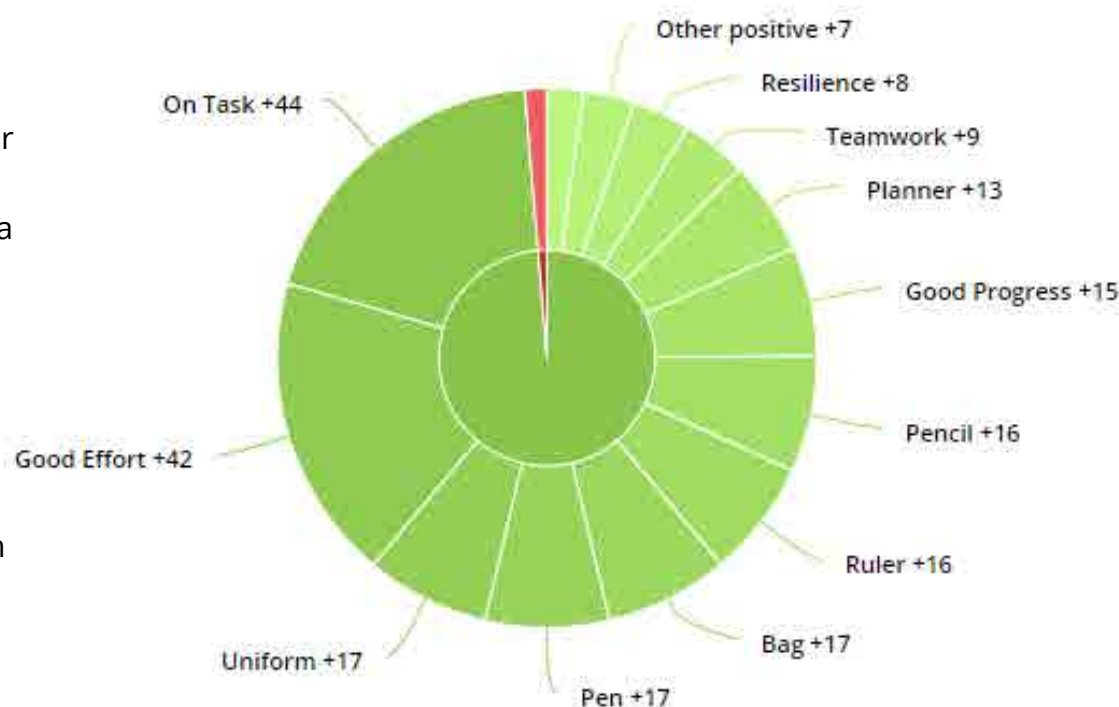
During lessons, teachers can award students with merits for a variety of reasons, for example; being on task, high levels of effort, speaking respectfully and resilience, to name but a few. Outside of lessons, students are also rewarded for positive interactions such as kindness and contributions to the whole school community. These merits are saved up across the year, and contribute to the whole school offer of rewards.

ClassCharts also allows teachers to record 'concerns', which are issued to restore learning within the classroom. This then gives each student a 'ratio' of positive to negative interactions with staff. Each parent/carer will be provided with a login for the system in the Autumn term, which allows you to access this information on a live feed.

ClassCharts is also used to monitor lesson attendance which you can also gain access to. Any homework that has been given to the student is also recorded in ClassCharts.

Parents/Carers will be issued with a login come September.

Behaviour score breakdown



During the lesson:

- We start lessons with the expected equipment; pen, pencil, ruler, PE kit
- We always wear the correct uniform without being asked
- We work collaboratively in learning pairs and groups
- We demonstrate PRIDE in all of our work
- We demonstrate mutual respect with staff and other learners
- We put away our headphones when in class and moving around school
- We demonstrate grown up habits for toilet breaks and water breaks during the day
- We complete all tasks to the best of our ability demonstrating our commitment to our learning
- We are aware of our learning starting points and rise to challenges set to move our learning forward and achieve
- We do not eat, drink or chew in lessons (drinking water is acceptable with the teacher's permission)

Outside the lesson:

- We arrive at school on time
- We arrive at all lessons on time and ready for learning
- We move sensibly around the school
- We show respect at all times, responding politely to all instructions and requests
- We do not eat or drink as we move around the building or between lessons
- We do not chew gum in school
- We demonstrate PRIDE in our homework
- We show respect for our school by putting all litter in the bins and not damaging property

We have recently introduced a new, exciting and innovative rewards system. Students will have access to a range of activities based on their behaviour ratio as measured by our ClassCharts system. Students can aim to access one of our Gold, Silver, Bronze reward experiences on a termly basis and this will be awarded according to the following criteria:

GOLD

Gold Award - 100% behaviour ratio

SILVER

Silver Award - 95% or above behaviour ratio

BRONZE

Bronze Award - 90% or above behaviour ratio

Students must also have 100% attendance over the course of the term (some authorised absences may be allowed at the discretion of the Progress Leader) and should have no disruptive or defiant behaviour logs during social time.

The aim of this system is to allow students to have a target in terms of their own behaviour for learning and to work with staff to achieve this. The rewards also aim to give students access to opportunities they may not have had previously.



At Burnside we offer students a broad and balanced curriculum we aim to:

- provide experiences which promote active and purposeful learning;
- enable understanding and skills to be applied to issues, problems and practical tasks;
- raise students' expectations, encourage participation and increase self-confidence and independence;
- allow individual students to progress at a pace which provides both challenge and support;
- give opportunities for students to work together, be well managed and supported by appropriate resources;

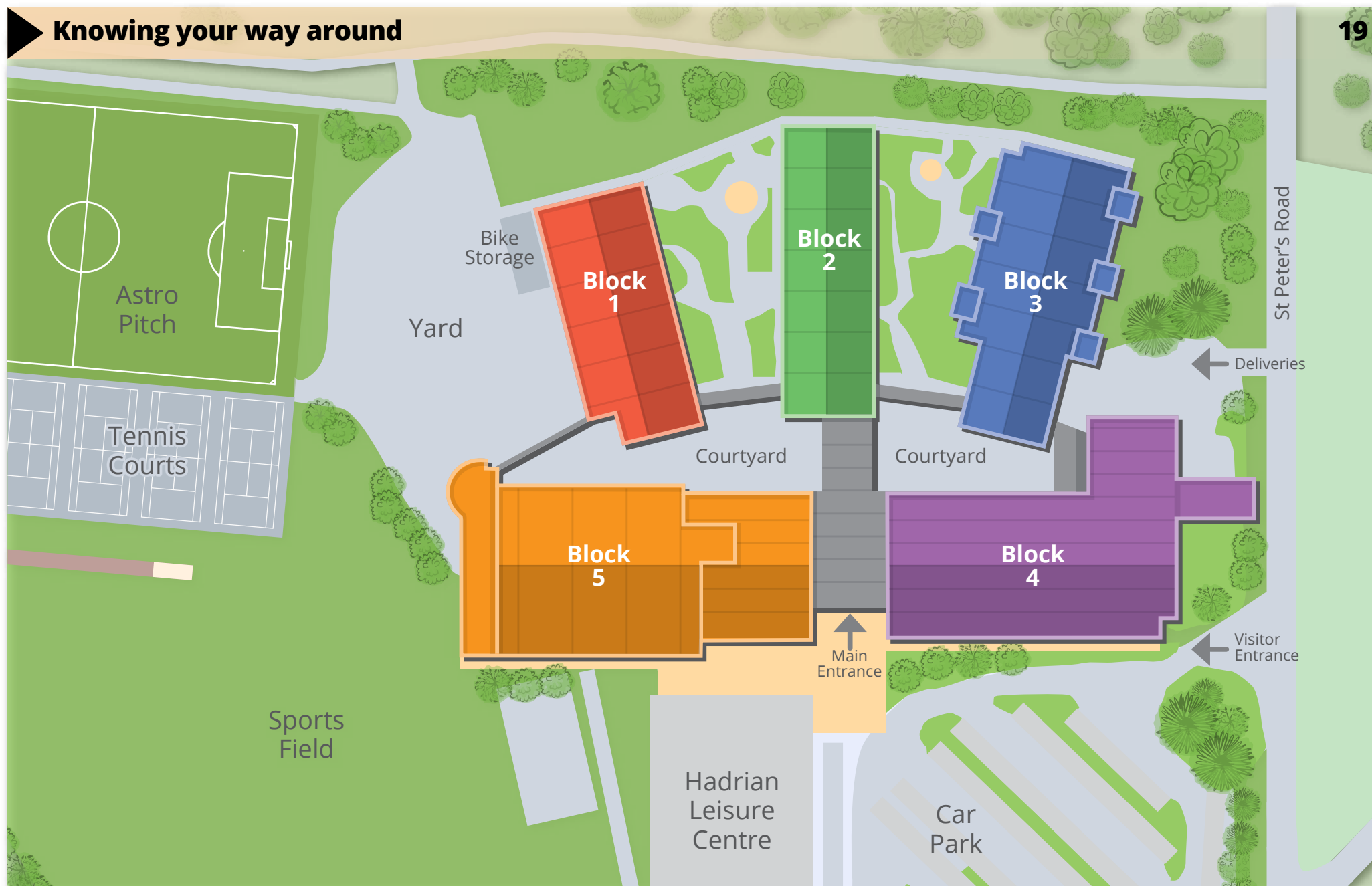

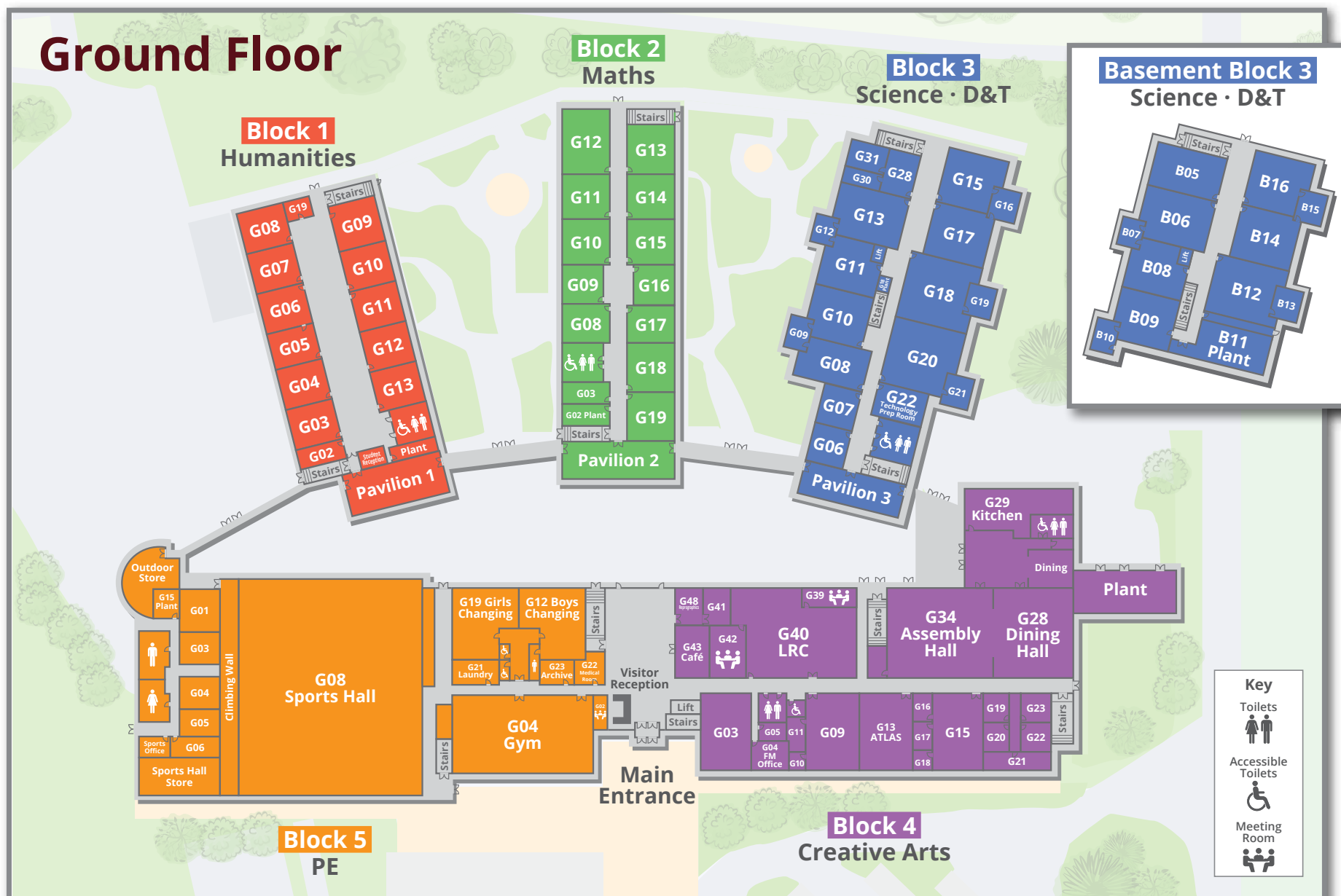

Knowing your way around

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Are there clubs I can join?

There are many activities going on after school and also during lunchtimes. A timetable of clubs can be found on the school website, it is also available for tutors to display in your classroom.

When will I get my timetable?

Your tutor will give you your timetable on your first day. You will be asked to write this down so that you do not lose it. Your timetable will show your class name, subject, teacher and room number.

What if I don't know anybody when I start school?

In every new year group there are always new students who come from their primary school without knowing anybody, they might be the only person from their year 6 class who comes to Burnside. Moving to secondary school can be a very anxious time for all new students, we appreciate that those who may not know anybody can be feeling particularly anxious and a little scared. We have transition days to help you make some new friends and get to know your tutor group. You will be encouraged to make as many new friends as you can during these visits, and hopefully by September you will be feeling more excited about starting Burnside.

What should I do if I have lost something in school? Where can I find lost property?

You are responsible for all your belongings in school, you should look after them at all times. Lost property is located at Main Reception. Try to retrace your steps if you can. You can check at breaktime/lunchtime and after school if you have lost something to see if anything has been handed in.

What if I am late for school?

It is your responsibility to ensure you arrive at school on time and fully prepared for the day ahead. You should always be in school before the start of Lesson Zero at 8:40. The doors to the student entrance will lock at 8:40. Should you arrive to school late you will need to enter via the late door next to Main Reception at the front of the school. You will be asked to sign in as late and give your reasons for being late. This 'late' mark is recorded on your attendance record and a lunchtime detention will be set for that day.

What should I do if my child is ill?

You should call the school before 8:30 and leave a message on the 'student absence' option. You should give your child's name, their tutor and the reason for absence. You will need to call the school every morning of each day of absence. Please refer to the attendance section of this handbook.

How do I pay for school lunches?

We operate a cashless system for school meals. We would encourage you to pay via 'Parent Pay'. This is a secure site used for online payments from home to school. You will be issued with login credentials before September in time to make payments ready for the new term. It is also useful to note that by using Parent Pay you will be able to monitor how much your child spends each day, set daily limits and also view what they have purchased for their lunch. Parent Pay will also be available to make payments for other activities such as school trips.

My child receives free school meals at primary school do I need to apply for secondary school?

No. You do not need to apply if your child is in receipt of free school meals. The local authority will be aware of the secondary school your child is transferring to and they will notify us accordingly. Credit will be assigned to your child's account on a daily basis. If you think you may be entitled to free school meals that you are not already accessing, please check this with your local authority.

How can I find out how my child is getting on in school?

You will be given access to ClassCharts which is a portal you can login and view various information about your child, such as their attendance, merits, concerns and homework. This is an excellent way to see how your child is progressing. Login credentials for this will be sent to you during the Autumn Term.

What should I do if I have any concerns about my child?

Your first point of contact for any concerns you may have will be your child's Progress Leader. You should ring the Main Reception in the first instance. If you are not sure which member of staff you need to speak to, our Receptionists are happy to help.

Burnside College is a fully inclusive school and we want all students to achieve their potential personally, socially, emotionally, physically and academically. We welcome students who join us with additional educational needs and we hope they will enjoy an environment where they can develop and achieve beyond their goals. Our aim is to provide support that enables learners to develop independence and prepare them for future study or the world of work. This can look quite different to the support they have received in primary school.

The AEN Department

The department leader: Miss L Hall is a teacher with experience of teaching all learners and significant knowledge of learners with additional needs and how they can be supported in a fully inclusive curriculum. She is supported by Miss C Jenkins (qualified SENCo) and is Deputy Headteacher for Behaviour and Welfare at Burnside.

Our Learning Support Assistants have great experience and all have specialist knowledge to address the learning needs of students who require specialist support. They mainly work with students who have a diagnosed need and where they are required to enable access or make reasonable adjustments to lessons. This is done through support plans and learning passports, which helps all students to participate fully in all aspects of school life.

At this time we are working closely with parents to identify if they feel their child would need additional support. We rely on parents to share information with us as you are experts on your child and you will be able to give a full picture of needs over time. If a child has previously had intervention or support we don't always know and this is particularly the case for students who arrive out of the area or have attended a number of previous schools. We have lots of additional resources within school and can support young people to overcome their barriers so please do let us know if you feel that we could use this to help your child to better settle and achieve well.

We know that some students develop the need for support whilst with us, particularly those who experience emotional and social issues. If you develop concerns about your child at any time or if you feel their behaviour is changing and you are worried that this is affecting home life please do let us know. The earlier we identify issues the quicker we can work to put them right and minimise the effect on learning. When parents work with us we find solutions.

At Burnside we encourage all students to become involved in the wider curriculum which enrich and broaden their experiences. We want all our students to develop into confident, happy, responsible, well-rounded individuals, armed with a wealth of experience to help them achieve and enjoy success in life.

Activities run over lunchtime and after school. Our students are also given the opportunity to participate in a wide range of educational trips and visits.

Some examples of the activities offered are:

Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, Young Civic Award, First Aid, Environment Group, Basketball, Badminton, Netball, Football, Just Dance, Calm Club, Burnside TV, Fitness Suite, Computing Club, Whizzing Bangs and STEM Ambassadors.

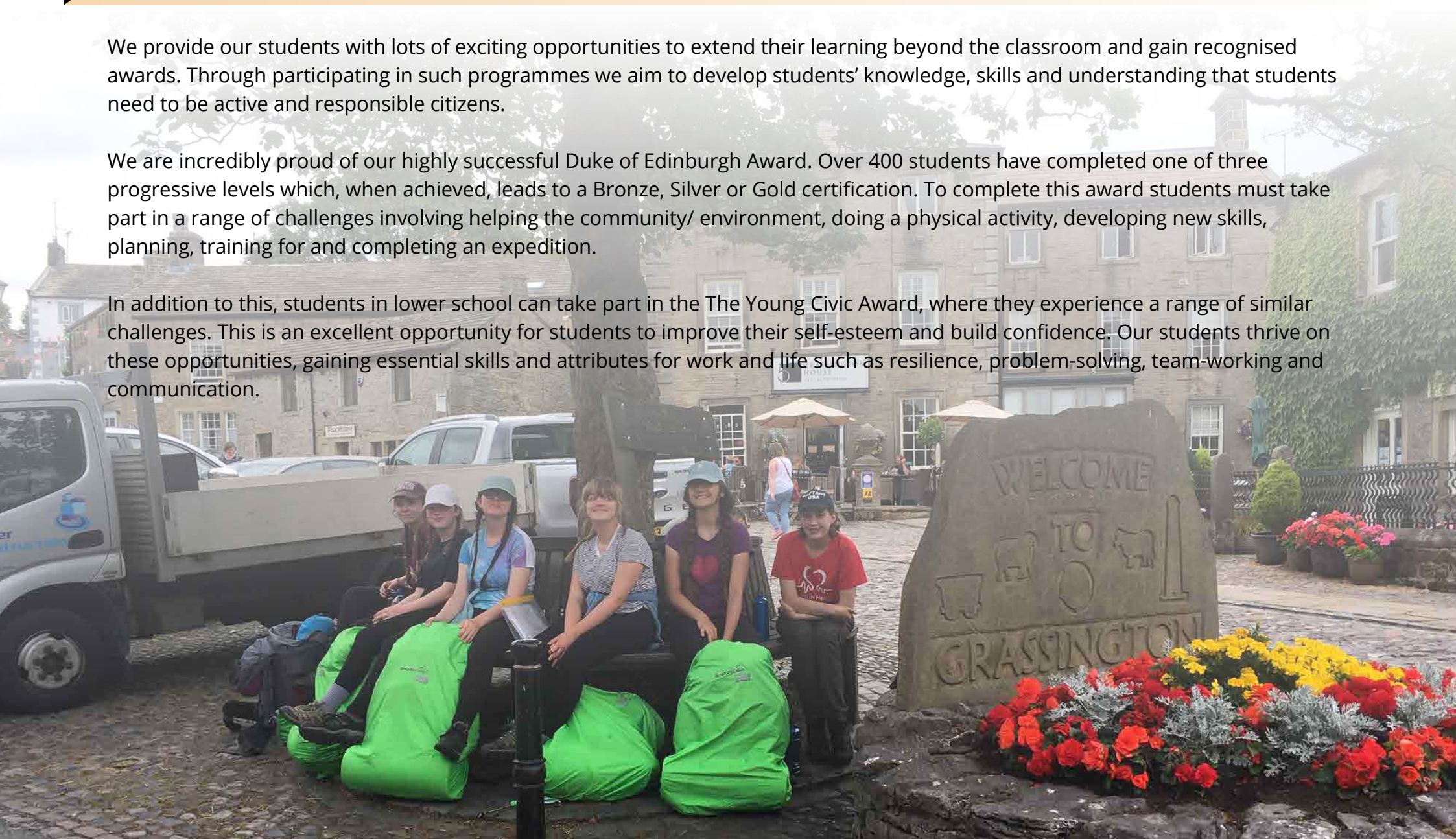

We provide our students with lots of exciting opportunities to extend their learning beyond the classroom and gain recognised awards. Through participating in such programmes we aim to develop students' knowledge, skills and understanding that students need to be active and responsible citizens.

We are incredibly proud of our highly successful Duke of Edinburgh Award. Over 400 students have completed one of three progressive levels which, when achieved, leads to a Bronze, Silver or Gold certification. To complete this award students must take part in a range of challenges involving helping the community/ environment, doing a physical activity, developing new skills, planning, training for and completing an expedition.

In addition to this, students in lower school can take part in the The Young Civic Award, where they experience a range of similar challenges. This is an excellent opportunity for students to improve their self-esteem and build confidence. Our students thrive on these opportunities, gaining essential skills and attributes for work and life such as resilience, problem-solving, team-working and communication.



At Burnside College we offer an unrivalled all-through 11 to 18 experience. Our outstanding sixth form was recognised by Ofsted as being a beacon of excellence in our last inspection. Students have the opportunity to continue their journey with us all the way through to age 18 as they prepare for the world of higher education or employment.

The number of students continuing at Burnside Sixth Form College is increasing year on year and we take students from other schools in the area due to our reputation for success. Students can look forward to tailored teaching that ensures rapid progress is made in all subjects. 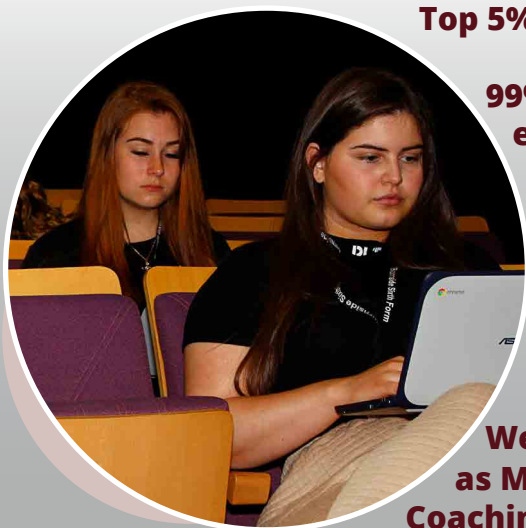
Top 5% of Schools in England #1 in North Tyneside 2017, 2018, 2019

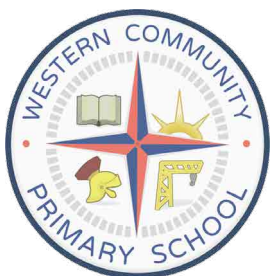
99% of our students last year went on to a sustained destination of education, training or employment

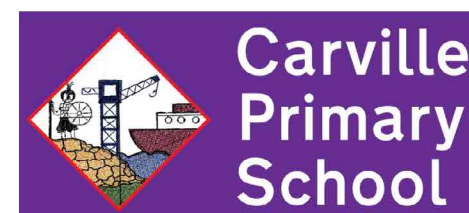

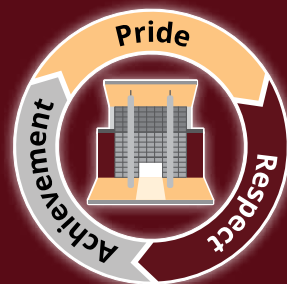
