## Friday lst May Fronted adverbials

Fronted adverbials can be added to the start of sentences to describe where, when or how something happened. It makes your writing more interesting.

There are some examples of each type of fronted adverbial sentence below.

Where : In class, the boy sat listening to his teacher. The fronted adverbial is 'In class' it tells us where.

When : After lunch, we played in the garden. The fronted adverbial is 'After lunch' it tells us when.

How: Without a sound, the boy snuck up the stairs. The fronted adverbial is 'Without a sound' it tells us how it happened.

After the fronted adverbial, you add a comma to separate this extra information from the rest of the sentence.
