The Reading Nest






Alex being responsible taking my dog Lily for a walk"

The Great Barrier Reef Facts

The Great Barrier Reef is the worlds largest coral reef, with over 2,900 individual reefs and 900 Islands. It is the largest living thing on Earth and is visible from outer space.

The Reef is located in the Coral Sea, off the coast of QueensInd Australia. It is the size of 70 million football fields!

Over 1,500 specices of fish live there, 411 types of hard coral and 134 types of sharks and rays. There are also 1500 species of fish, 215 types of birds and even 17 types of sea snakes. Some of the species are endangered including the Turtles that live there.

It is thought that the Great Barrier Reerf is as much as 20,000,000 years old.

The Great Barrier Reef is such a beautiful place to visit with tropical islands and golden beaches which is why it is home to so millions of visitors every year.








Great work, Daniel. I agree that the Great Barrier Reef is a wonderful place! I hope you get to visit Queensland one day!




Beth showing her readiness to learn in this powerpoint she created and sent to her teacher.
