

## Adverbs

Adverbs add to adjectives – they tell us more about the description.

The **silly** dragon...

How silly is the dragon?

The **smart** princess ...

How smart is the princess?

Now try it  
yourself!



*We can choose an adverb.*

extremely

very

unusually

really

exceptionally

quite

*Now we can finish the sentence.*

The **extremely silly** dragon tired himself out.

The **really smart** princess  
outwitted the dragon.

## Using adverbs

- Add some more information to make a sentence. E.g. *A lot of really handsome dragons from all over the mountains flew past us.*
- Repeat this to generate a new description and a new sentence.

	unusually frequently	green happy	paper bag prison
	quite usually	tall sad	

*Remember* - you can add an -s or -es to turn each noun into a plural (more than one of them), e.g. dragons, princesses.
