Lesson 5:

Difference and diversity Learning outcomes:

- To understand that differences and similarities between people arise from a number of factors, including family, cultural, ethnic, racial and religious diversity (KS2: R13)
- Considered why being different can provoke bullying and why this is unacceptable
- To realise the nature and consequence of discrimination, teasing, bullying and aggressive behaviours and prejudice based language (KS2: R14)

Activity 1

"No Outsiders" Read the following quote by Desmond Tutu: "Everyone is an insider, there are no outsiders - whatever their beliefs, whatever their colour, gender or sexuality." Archbishop Desmond Tutu, February 2004. What do you think it means to be an "outsider" Talk to an adult, share your ideas.

Activity 2: "Diversity"

Diversity means difference.

In what ways are human beings different? The same? How does it feel when we're the same as others? (e.g. a sense of belonging, safety, included?) How does it feel when we're different to others? Can you think of a time when you felt very different to others?
